- ☐ **absence** (*noun*) The state of being away from a place or person
Synonyms: nonattendance, lack, unavailability, void
- ☐ **absurd** (*adjective*) Wildly unreasonable, illogical, or ridiculous
Synonyms: ridiculous, foolish, silly, preposterous
- ☐ **abundance** (*noun*) A very large quantity of something; more than enough
Synonyms: plenty, wealth, profusion, surplus
- ☐ **abundant** (*adjective*) Existing or available in large quantities; plentiful

- ☐ **accuse** (*verb*) To claim that someone has done something wrong or illegal

- ☐ **acquire** (*verb*) To gain or obtain something, especially through effort or ability

- ☐ **across** (*preposition*) From one side to the other of something
Synonyms: over, through, beyond, spanning
- ☐ **address** (*noun*) The details of where someone lives or where a building is located
Synonyms: location, residence, speech, talk
- ☐ **adhere** (*verb*) To stick firmly to something; to follow rules or beliefs closely
Synonyms: stick, cling, follow, obey
- ☐ **admission** (*noun*) The act of allowing someone to enter a place, or the act of confessing something is true
Synonyms: entry, access, confession, acknowledgement
- ☐ **adopt** (*verb*) To take something as your own, such as a child, an idea, or a way of doing things
Synonyms: embrace, accept, take on, choose
- ☐ **advance** (*verb*) To move forward or make progress; to develop or improve

- ☐ **affable** (*adjective*) Friendly, good-natured, and easy to talk to

- ☐ **altitude** (*noun*) The height of something above sea level or ground level
Synonyms: height, elevation, level
- ☐ **ambition** (*noun*) A strong desire to achieve something; determination to succeed
Synonyms: aspiration, goal, drive, determination
- ☐ **amount** (*noun*) The total number or quantity of something
Synonyms: quantity, total, sum, measure
- ☐ **ample** (*adjective*) Enough or more than enough; plentiful
Synonyms: sufficient, enough, plenty, abundant
- ☐ **antiquity** (*noun*) The ancient past, especially before the Middle Ages; great age
Synonyms: ancient times, distant past, olden days
- ☐ **anxious** (*adjective*) Feeling worried or nervous about something uncertain

- ☐ **appeal** (*verb*) To make a serious request for help; or to be attractive or interesting to someone

- ☐ **appearance** (*noun*) The way that someone or something looks; or the act of arriving somewhere

- ☐ **apprehensive** (*adjective*) Anxious or fearful about something that might happen

- ☐ **approve** (*verb*) To officially agree to something or to think that something is good

- ☐ **arduous** (*adjective*) Requiring great effort or endurance; difficult and tiring

- ☐ **argument** (*noun*) A disagreement or quarrel; or a reason given to support an idea

- ☐ **arouse** (*verb*) To awaken or stir up feelings, interest, or reactions

- ☐ **artful** (*adjective*) Clever or skilful, especially in a crafty or cunning way

- ☐ **article** (*noun*) A piece of writing in a newspaper or magazine; or a particular item or object

- ☐ **assemble** (*verb*) To gather together in one place; to fit together the parts of something

- ☐ **assiduous** (*adjective*) Showing great care, attention, and persistent effort

- ☐ **assistance** (*noun*) Help or support given to someone

- ☐ **asunder** (*adverb*) Into separate parts or pieces; apart
Synonyms: apart, into pieces, in two, separate
- ☐ **attached** (*adjective*) Joined or connected to something; or feeling close and affectionate towards someone

- ☐ **attempt** (*verb*) To try to do something, especially something difficult
Synonyms: try, endeavour, strive, undertake
- ☐ **available** (*adjective*) Ready to be used or obtained; free to do something
Synonyms: accessible, obtainable, free, at hand
- ☐ **average** (*adjective*) Typical or ordinary; in the middle between extremes
Synonyms: typical, ordinary, normal, standard
- ☐ **avoid** (*verb*) To stay away from something or someone; to prevent something from happening
Synonyms: evade, escape, dodge, shun
- ☐ **avowed** (*adjective*) Openly declared or admitted; stated publicly without hiding
Synonyms: declared, admitted, acknowledged, professed
- ☐ **awkward** (*adjective*) Causing difficulty or embarrassment; clumsy and ungraceful

- ☐ **banish** (*verb*) To send someone away as punishment; to get rid of something

- ☐ **bargain** (*noun*) A good deal where you pay less than expected, or to negotiate the price of something

- ☐ **barren** (*adjective*) Too poor or dry to produce vegetation; empty and lifeless
Synonyms: infertile, unproductive, desolate, sterile
- ☐ **beautiful** (*adjective*) Very pleasing to look at or experience; having qualities that delight the senses

- ☐ **because** (*conjunction*) For the reason that; used to explain why something happens
Synonyms: since, as, due to
- ☐ **beck** (*noun*) A small stream or brook, especially in northern England; also a gesture of summoning
Synonyms: stream, brook, creek
- ☐ **believe** (*verb*) To accept that something is true or that someone is telling the truth
Synonyms: trust, accept, have faith
- ☐ **belligerent** (*adjective*) Hostile and aggressive; eager to fight
Synonyms: aggressive, hostile, combative, warlike
- ☐ **bemused** (*adjective*) Puzzled, confused, or bewildered
Synonyms: confused, puzzled, bewildered, perplexed
- ☐ **benefit** (*noun*) An advantage or good result; to receive help or gain something positive
Synonyms: advantage, gain, profit
- ☐ **benevolent** (*adjective*) Well-meaning and kindly; showing goodwill
Synonyms: kind, generous, charitable, compassionate

- ☐ **besieged** (*adjective*) Surrounded by enemy forces trying to capture a place; overwhelmed by many demands or problems
Synonyms: surrounded, blockaded, overwhelmed
- ☐ **betray** (*verb*) To be disloyal to someone who trusts you; to reveal a secret or show hidden feelings
Synonyms: deceive, double-cross, reveal
- ☐ **bewildered** (*adjective*) Completely confused and unable to understand
Synonyms: confused, puzzled, perplexed, baffled
- ☐ **bicycle** (*noun*) A vehicle with two wheels that you ride by pushing pedals with your feet
Synonyms: bike, cycle, two-wheeler
- ☐ **box** (*noun*) A container with flat sides, usually square or rectangular; to fight with fists as a sport

- ☐ **brief** (*adjective*) Lasting only a short time; a short summary of information; to give someone essential information

- ☐ **Britain** (*noun*) An island nation in northwest Europe, comprising England, Scotland, and Wales
Synonyms: United Kingdom, UK, Great Britain
- ☐ **broad** (*adjective*) Wide from side to side; covering a large range or variety of things
Synonyms: wide, extensive, vast
- ☐ **bruise** (*noun*) A dark mark on your skin caused by an injury; to cause such a mark or to hurt someone's feelings
Synonyms: contusion, mark, injury
- ☐ **brusque** (*adjective*) Abrupt or offhand in speech or manner; rudely brief
Synonyms: curt, abrupt, blunt, short
- ☐ **burden** (*noun*) A heavy load; something difficult to bear or manage

- ☐ **business** (*noun*) Work relating to buying and selling goods or services; a company or shop; a matter or situation

- ☐ **careering** (*verb*) Moving swiftly and in an uncontrolled way

- ☐ **category** (*noun*) A group of things sharing similar characteristics; a class or division

- ☐ **caulking** (*noun*) A waterproof substance used to fill gaps and seal joints
Synonyms: sealant, filler, putty
- ☐ **caution** (*noun*) Care taken to avoid danger or mistakes; a warning
Synonyms: care, carefulness, warning, vigilance

- ☐ **cease** (*verb*) To come or bring to an end; to stop
Synonyms: stop, end, halt, finish
- ☐ **cemetery** (*noun*) A place where dead people are buried; a graveyard

- ☐ **composition** (*noun*) The way something is put together; a piece of writing or music
Synonyms: structure, arrangement, essay, piece
- ☐ **comprehend** (*verb*) To understand something fully
Synonyms: understand, grasp, perceive, fathom
- ☐ **comrade** (*noun*) A companion who shares activities or experiences; a fellow member
Synonyms: companion, colleague, friend, ally
- ☐ **conceal** (*verb*) To hide or keep something secret
Synonyms: hide, cover, disguise, mask
- ☐ **conceited** (*adjective*) Excessively proud of oneself; vain

- ☐ **concentrated** (*adjective*) Focused intensely; made stronger by removing water or other substances

- ☐ **conclusion** (*noun*) The end of something; a judgement or decision reached by reasoning

- ☐ **condemn** (*verb*) To express strong disapproval of; to sentence to punishment

- ☐ **conferred** (*verb*) Discussed something to reach a decision; granted an honour or title

- ☐ **confine** (*verb*) To keep within limits; to restrict or imprison

- ☐ **conscience** (*noun*) An inner sense of what is right and wrong that guides behaviour

- ☐ **conscious** (*adjective*) Aware of and responding to one's surroundings; deliberate and intentional
Synonyms: aware, awake, alert, deliberate
- ☐ **consent** (*noun*) Permission or agreement to do something
Synonyms: permission, agreement, approval, authorisation
- ☐ **conserve** (*verb*) To protect something from harm or destruction; to use carefully to prevent waste
Synonyms: preserve, protect, save, maintain
- ☐ **consideration** (*noun*) Careful thought about something; thoughtfulness for others
Synonyms: thought, deliberation, regard, thoughtfulness
- ☐ **consist** (*verb*) To be made up or composed of certain parts or elements

- ☐ **conspire** (*verb*) To make secret plans together, usually to do something harmful
Synonyms: plot, scheme, plan, collude

- ☐ **constant** (*adjective*) Happening continuously; remaining the same and not changing
Synonyms: continuous, unchanging, steady, persistent
- ☐ **consume** (*verb*) To eat, drink, or use up something
Synonyms: eat, devour, use, expend
- ☐ **contemporary** (*adjective*) Living or occurring at the same time; belonging to the present day
Synonyms: modern, current, present-day, recent
- ☐ **contempt** (*noun*) A feeling that someone or something is worthless; scorn
Synonyms: scorn, disdain, disrespect, derision
- ☐ **content** (*adjective*) Satisfied and happy with what one has; at peace
Synonyms: satisfied, pleased, happy, fulfilled
- ☐ **contest** (*noun*) A competition in which people try to win; a struggle for victory
Synonyms: competition, tournament, match, championship
- ☐ **contract** (*noun*) A formal written agreement between two or more parties
Synonyms: agreement, deal, pact, arrangement
- ☐ **contrast** (*noun*) A striking difference between two things when compared
Synonyms: difference, distinction, opposition, dissimilarity
- ☐ **contribute** (*verb*) To give something to help achieve a goal or be part of something
Synonyms: give, donate, provide, supply
- ☐ **conventional** (*adjective*) Following traditional or accepted customs and practices
Synonyms: traditional, standard, normal, typical
- ☐ **convert** (*verb*) To change something into a different form or purpose
Synonyms: change, transform, turn, alter
- ☐ **convey** (*verb*) To transport or communicate something from one place to another
Synonyms: communicate, express, transport, carry
- ☐ **convict** (*verb*) To declare someone guilty of a crime in a court of law
Synonyms: condemn, sentence, find guilty
- ☐ **convince** (*verb*) To persuade someone that something is true or to do something
Synonyms: persuade, influence, assure, satisfy
- ☐ **correct** (*adjective*) Free from error; true and accurate
Synonyms: right, accurate, true, exact
- ☐ **covert** (*adjective*) Not openly shown or acknowledged; secret
Synonyms: secret, hidden, concealed, undercover
- ☐ **covet** (*verb*) To want something greatly, especially something that belongs to someone else
Synonyms: desire, want, crave, yearn for
- ☐ **coy** (*adjective*) Pretending to be shy or modest; reluctant to give information
Synonyms: shy, modest, bashful, reserved
- ☐ **credit** (*noun*) Recognition for an achievement; the ability to buy now and pay later
Synonyms: recognition, acknowledgement, praise, trust
- ☐ **cultivate** (*verb*) To prepare land for growing crops; to develop or improve something
Synonyms: grow, develop, nurture, foster

- ☐ **cunning** (*adjective*) Having skill in achieving one's aims through deceit or cleverness
Synonyms: clever, crafty, sly, shrewd
- ☐ **curb** (*verb*) To control or limit something; to keep in check
Synonyms: control, limit, restrain, restrict
- ☐ **custom** (*noun*) A traditional practice or usual way of behaving
Synonyms: tradition, practice, habit, ritual

- ☐ **debate** (*noun/verb*) A formal discussion where opposing arguments are presented; to argue or discuss a topic thoroughly.
Synonyms: discussion, argument, deliberation, dispute
- ☐ **debrief** (*verb*) To question someone thoroughly after a mission or event to gather information about what happened.
Synonyms: question, interview, examine, interrogate
- ☐ **deceit** (*noun*) The act of deceiving someone; dishonest behaviour intended to make someone believe something false.
Synonyms: deception, dishonesty, fraud, trickery
- ☐ **deceive** (*verb*) To cause someone to believe something that is not true; to trick or mislead deliberately.
Synonyms: trick, mislead, fool, dupe
- ☐ **declare** (*verb*) To announce officially or formally; to state something firmly and publicly.
Synonyms: announce, proclaim, state, assert
- ☐ **decline** (*verb/noun*) To politely refuse something offered; or a gradual decrease in quality, quantity, or importance.
Synonyms: refuse, reject, decrease, deteriorate
- ☐ **definite** (*adjective*) Clearly stated or decided; not vague or doubtful; certain and unambiguous.
Synonyms: certain, clear, precise, specific
- ☐ **deliberate** (*adjective/verb*) Done consciously and intentionally; or to think about something carefully before making a decision.
Synonyms: intentional, planned, calculated, consider
- ☐ **demolished** (*verb (past tense)*) Completely destroyed or torn down, especially a building or structure.
Synonyms: destroyed, razed, wrecked, levelled
- ☐ **deny** (*verb*) To state that something is not true; to refuse to give or allow something.
Synonyms: refute, reject, contradict, refuse
- ☐ **deposit** (*noun/verb*) A sum of money placed in a bank; a layer of matter left by a natural process; to put something down.
Synonyms: payment, sediment, place, store
- ☐ **depot** (*noun*) A place for storing goods or vehicles; a bus or train station.
Synonyms: warehouse, terminal, station, storehouse
- ☐ **derelict** (*adjective/noun*) In a very poor condition due to neglect; an abandoned building or ship.
Synonyms: abandoned, dilapidated, neglected, ruined
- ☐ **description** (*noun*) A spoken or written account of the characteristics or features of something or someone.
Synonyms: account, portrayal, depiction, explanation

- ☐ **despair** (*noun/verb*) Complete loss of hope; to feel that there is no hope left.
Synonyms: hopelessness, anguish, misery, desperation
- ☐ **desperately** (*adverb*) In a way that shows great urgency, need, or hopelessness; extremely.
Synonyms: urgently, frantically, extremely, intensely
- ☐ **despise** (*verb*) To feel intense dislike or contempt for someone or something.
Synonyms: hate, loathe, detest, abhor
- ☐ **destitute** (*adjective*) Extremely poor and lacking the basic necessities of life.
Synonyms: impoverished, penniless, poverty-stricken, needy
- ☐ **determine** (*verb*) To discover facts through investigation; to firmly decide or resolve to do something.
Synonyms: establish, discover, decide, resolve
- ☐ **develop** (*verb*) To grow or cause to grow more advanced, mature, or elaborate over time.
Synonyms: grow, evolve, progress, advance
- ☐ **device** (*noun*) A piece of equipment or tool designed for a particular purpose.
Synonyms: gadget, instrument, tool, apparatus
- ☐ **devote** (*verb*) To give all or most of one's time, energy, or resources to a person, activity, or cause.
Synonyms: dedicate, commit, pledge, allocate
- ☐ **dictionary** (*noun*) A book or electronic resource listing words alphabetically with their meanings, pronunciations, and other information.
Synonyms: lexicon, wordbook, glossary, vocabulary
- ☐ **digest** (*verb/noun*) To break down food in the body; to understand and absorb information; a summary of information.
Synonyms: absorb, assimilate, process, summary
- ☐ **dilapidated** (*adjective*) In a state of severe disrepair or ruin, especially due to age or neglect.
Synonyms: rundown, decrepit, ramshackle, crumbling
- ☐ **diligent** (*adjective*) Showing careful and persistent effort in work or duties.
Synonyms: hardworking, industrious, thorough, conscientious
- ☐ **diluted** (*adjective/verb*) Made weaker or thinner by adding water or another substance.
Synonyms: weakened, watered-down, thinned, reduced
- ☐ **din** (*noun*) A loud, unpleasant, and prolonged noise.
Synonyms: racket, noise, clamour, commotion
- ☐ **disappear** (*verb*) To cease to be visible; to vanish from sight or existence.
Synonyms: vanish, fade, evaporate, dissolve
- ☐ **disappointed** (*adjective*) Feeling sad or displeased because someone or something has failed to meet expectations.
Synonyms: let down, disheartened, dissatisfied, crestfallen
- ☐ **disarray** (*noun*) A state of disorder and confusion; untidiness.
Synonyms: disorder, chaos, mess, confusion
- ☐ **disastrous** (*adjective*) Causing great damage, harm, or suffering; extremely bad or unsuccessful.
Synonyms: catastrophic, devastating, ruinous, calamitous
- ☐ **disclose** (*verb*) To make secret or new information known; to reveal or expose.
Synonyms: reveal, divulge, expose, uncover

- ☐ **discontent** (*noun/adjective*) Dissatisfaction with one's circumstances; a feeling of unhappiness.
Synonyms: dissatisfaction, displeasure, unhappiness, frustration
- ☐ **dishevelled** (*adjective*) Having a untidy or disordered appearance, especially referring to hair or clothing.
Synonyms: untidy, unkempt, messy, rumpled
- ☐ **dismal** (*adjective*) Causing or suggesting sadness or gloom; depressing; extremely poor in quality.
Synonyms: gloomy, dreary, bleak, depressing
- ☐ **disperse** (*verb*) To scatter or spread widely in different directions; to cause a group to break up.
Synonyms: scatter, spread, dissipate, distribute
- ☐ **dispute** (*noun/verb*) A disagreement or argument between people, or to argue and question whether something is true or correct
Synonyms: argument, disagreement, conflict
- ☐ **distasteful** (*adjective*) Causing dislike or disgust; unpleasant or offensive.
Synonyms: unpleasant, offensive, disagreeable, objectionable
- ☐ **distinct** (*adjective*) Clearly different or separate; easily perceived or understood.
Synonyms: clear, definite, separate, different
- ☐ **distinguished** (*adjective*) Successful and commanding great respect; dignified in appearance or manner.
Synonyms: eminent, renowned, notable, celebrated
